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PROFILE

Dr Angeliki Chrysanthi currently serves as an Adjunct Lecturer at the Department of Cultural Technology and Communication of the University of the Aegean, in Greece. Her background is in Art History and Archaeology (BA, National and Kapodistrian University of Athens, Greece), in Protection of Monuments (M.Sc., National Technical University of Athens, Greece), and she holds a doctoral degree from the University of Southampton, UK. Her thesis entitled "Augmenting Archaeological Walks. Theoretical and Methodological Considerations.", examines the role of interpretative design in visitor movement and behaviour in spaces of cultural significance, and the contribution of qualitative research alongside computation and novel technologies to this research inquiry. During and after her postgraduate studies, she worked in her capacity as a Digital Heritage expert and researcher in Greece and mainly abroad. In 2016, she was appointed as Digital Humanities Postdoctoral Research Associate at the University of Sheffield and Visiting Research Fellow at the University of Chester in the UK before moving to Greece in 2017.

Her teaching, research, and publications center on the design, management, use and reuse of digital cultural and heritage data for the development of hybrid storytelling experiences, as well as the study of spatial and social patterns of engagement with such experiences. She also has extensive experience in independent teaching and supervision at an undergraduate and postgraduate level in Greek and English, as well as in using novel audiovisual practices and online platforms to deliver synchronous or asynchronous teaching. Finally, she has organised and participated in numerous seminars, workshops and conferences, and she systematically publishes her work in scientific journals of her research domain.
