(3) SYLLABUS

This course introduces students to the study of significant changes related to new social and cultural structures and identities, which are emerging in the "post-industrial" and increasingly "globalized" world of the late 20th and early 21st centuries. In doing so, it presents and critically discusses theoretical approaches concerned with analyzing the complex character of modernity and the relationship between the modern and postmodern society. Emphasis is given to theoretical approaches which emerged mainly from the post-structuralism movement and doubt basic principles of modernity. The course also presents key debates on whether the paradigms and theories used to explain and analyze modern societies are adequate for post-industrial societies.

The course is divided into thirteen lectures. The weekly schedule of course topics is presented in detail during the first lecture and remain available in the e-class of the course afterwards.
