It will offer a critical look at the historical development of non-fiction film forms, mostly documentary and ethnographic films as well as experimental films from early films to contemporary examples. It will cover documentary theories and criticism, ethical issues, issues around the problematic of representation, developing ideas, research methods, writing proposals, funding, and distribution rights.
