Students learn about the evaluation criteria during the initial course lecture at the beginning of the semester. The evaluation criteria can be found throughout the semester in the course's link in eclass (eclass.aegean.gr). The evaluation of students is based on the grade of the final oral examination in all the taught material at a rate of 80% while the project exercise receives 20% of the final grade.
